## Request under Freedom of Information Act 2000

Thank you for your request for information which we received on Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> October 2023. I am pleased to confirm the following.

#### 1. General Information:

How many active Patient Group Directions (PGDs) does the Trust currently have in place?

58

In which departments or services within the Trust are PGDs most used?

In terms of numbers of PGDs: Emergency Department (14), Ophthalmology (13) Imaging (12)

#### **Usage of PGDs:**

Over the past 3 years, how many patients have been treated under a PGD in the Trust?

We are unable to extract this data to provide a meaningful response. To add, we are currently only live with ED and inpatients in the Trust, so any PGDs administered in an outpatient setting would not be recorded via eCARE (electronic prescribing system) and therefore we would only be providing a partial response.

How does the Trust ensure that PGDs are only used by those healthcare professionals competent to do so?

Only HCPs who are trained and competent are authorised by signatures (the HCP's and the authorising manager) to operate under PGD.
